For the past 22 months, many WVC employees have been working behind the scenes to ready the launch of ctcLink. ctcLink is a single, centralized system of online functions to give students, faculty and staff anytime, anywhere access to a modern, efficient way of doing their college business. ctcLink allows students to manage classes, check progress toward a degree, communicate with the financial aid department, request academic records, and more.

The road to launch was not easy because ctcLink is about much more than a new software. It replaces a 40year-old administrative system. Together, the 34 colleges in our system had to examine core business processes and practices and align them together across the system. Not an easy task!

WVC launched ctcLink for employees on Feb. 8. The process when very smoothly for such a large project.

The system was launched for students on Feb. 22. While the student launch was not as smooth due to statewide registration issues, our employees continue to work tirelessly to help students get registered for spring quarter.

HB 2158 Negotiations: High Demand and Guided Pathways Funds

Negotiations have not moved forward on High Demand and Guided Pathways funds due to scheduling conflicts. The AHE anticipates that we will be able to finalize negotiations for the remaining HB 2158 funds before spring break. We continue to be concerned about how the funds for high demand will create "tiers" of faculty, where some faculty will be paid more than others because of their field or program. This can erode faculty unity and morale.

Faculty Survey on Workload and Stress

As reported during the February meeting, the AHE Executive Board conducted a faculty survey looking at faculty workload and stress. Faculty have had to do tremendous work to put their classes online over the past year, often recording hundreds of hours of lectures and videos, finding new content that works in an online environment, and redesigning courses. At the same time, many faculty are struggling in the ways that are common to many people in our community. Most notably, a lack of childcare and in-person school has created untenable work-at-home scenarios for many. Faculty stress is at an all-time high. The AHE Executive Board submitted the results of the survey in a report last month. Conversations between administration and union leadership has resulted in one small gain: some access to campus offices for work. Faculty still report high levels of stress and low morale, so union leadership has presented a list of recommendations to administration that will address both the elevated stress and the low morale. We look forward to further conversations with administration around this important issue.

Administrative Services

- Administrative Services staff continue to participate in statewide COVID meetings as well as weekly Business Affairs Commission (BAC) meeting. Administrative Service will have participated in the initial Chelan Douglas EPA Brownfield Advisory Committee by the time of the next Board meeting. Admin. Services will share any insights and information from the first meeting.
- Administrative Service also is working with the Wenatchee School District to host a districtwide testing event for WSD's online learners sometime in between March and May 2021. The college's ICS team has been engaged and will provide guidance on safety and security for the event.

Budget & Internal Auditing

 Budget staff continue to work closely with ctcLink and Fiscal Services staff on migration to ctcLink. Budget staff continue to work with IT to establish comparable budget reports to FMSQuery that college budget managers have come to rely on. We believe a budget tool will be available in the next few weeks. Fiscal Services staff will be going through their first month end close in ctcLink, a process that has become far more cumbersome than in our legacy system. Additionally, we have started to process our first checks in the new account payable (AP) system. Finally, WVC was recognized statewide for having our capital tracking module up and running before any of the other deployment group four school (DG4) in the state.

Fiscal Services

- CtcLink activities remain the primary focus of Fiscal Services staff. The initial two payrolls have been processed through ctcLink in collaboration with Human Resources with increasing success. Minor technical issues remain; however, the team continues to improve gain a greater understanding of the system and communicate errors with State Board staff.
- Fiscal Services continue to work with the SAO office on the college's financial statement audit. The audit team has completed all onsite and offsite testing. The results of the audit are currently being reviewed by SAO leadership. I am pleased to report that we are on pace for another clean audition with two minor adjustments that we have agreed to correct.

Facilities and Capital

- Wells Hall-
 - The Well Hall project is still going well with Facilities staff progressing through the furniture and technology selection process. The various trades are working effectively within the confines of social distancing by staging activities throughout the building. The third floor has received its

final concrete grind for the flooring and has been approved by WVC staff and our architectural consultant. Pictures will be shared with Board at the March meeting.

- Minor Works-
 - WVC facilities staff continue to work towards completing all minor works projects by the end of the biennium. We have tentatively agreed to defer two small minor works projects until next biennium. We are currently waiting for legislative action prior to officially delaying these two projects.

Safety and Security

• SSEM staff remain in communication with local health official ensuring that the college has the latest information concerning COVID-19 infections and best practices related to containment and contact tracing.

Educational Achievement

- Guided Pathways. The Steering Committee created a process for faculty to apply for funds provided to the College by the state. They received eight proposals and will be making recommendations to the instruction leadership team this week. They also have a plan for district-wide development of program maps.
- Assessment. The Assessment Coordinators are working their plan for the year, which focuses on
 assessment of program learning outcomes. A recent meeting between the Coordinators, Dean Tudor, Dr.
 Treat and Ty Jones concluded with an agreement that the Coordinators are headed in the right direction
 helping faculty with program level assessment and that their outcomes will be important for the upcoming
 ad hoc report and visit.

Support for Learning

- Student Success. The Communications faculty are collaborating to create a week-one module they will share and use each quarter. The module will introduce students to the technologies and learning methods they will use during the courses, which is especially important for remote teaching and learning.
- Returning to campus. The Music department is preparing to offer a vocal ensemble in Spring, if approved, following new state guidelines for rehearsals and performances. In the Art department, the Spring Illustration class, commonly known as "the mural class," will include the option for students to work outdoors, on campus, painting murals.
- Math/Science Math Faculty and Guided Pathways: Math faculty have applied for Guided Pathways funding to create an intrusive advising model for math students. These efforts would allow a faculty member to work to identify students struggling in math, reach out and provide individualized support and resources. They have also applied for funding to allow a faculty member to work on developmental math pathways.

Diversity and Cultural Enrichment

- Math/Science Equity in Instruction: Discussion surrounding political climate in a department chair meeting led to broader discussion about racial equity on WVC's campus and in the classroom. Faculty expressed interest in an ongoing discussion group surrounding efforts to improve equity in instruction. An initial meeting has been scheduled with a handful of faculty/chairs planning to attend and participate.
- Math/Science Leading with Equity: Discussion regarding leading with racial equity took place at most recent Student Services/Instruction Leadership team meeting. Goal is to combine efforts and increase capacity for all current equity work taking place on campus in various areas. This will be a standing item on the agenda for all meetings moving forward with potential for action items and recommendations. Responsiveness to Local Needs

- 30 RN to BSN seats have been filled for Summer 2021 cohort (confirmation deadline 3.19.21) will continue with a waitlist to ensure a full cohort. WVC Foundation announced this week new scholarship opportunities for the RN to BSN students.
- Working with CH to create a pathway for Emergency Department Nursing Technician opportunities for first and second year Nursing students.
- Nursing Department in collaboration with clinical partners from throughout the region placed 54 2nd year students in 10 different facilities for their final clinical quarter in Spring 2021. No virtual clinical experiences planned, all face to face patient care (as compared to one year ago when 100% of clinical learning was virtual).
- Nursing students from both campuses participating in regional COVID testing, N95 mask fitting and vaccinations.
- SNOW & SNOW@O (Student Nurses of Wenatchee and Omak) hosted a panel presentation on March 3rd with the Vice President of Nursing from CH and two ICU nurses "Nursing Leadership and Administrative challenges related to COVID-19"

• Math/Science Faculty Surveying Students: As faculty look ahead to the 2021-2022 annual schedule, they are surveying students about their projected needs for next year. They will be working to determine majority need/desire regarding course format as well as resources.

EDUCATIONAL PLANNING/CAREER SERVICES

- In preparation for ctcLink implementation, the entire team was on campus. Main projects included:
 - Batch Advisor Assignments. A manual process that included entering one advisor at a time.
 - Navigating/learning the new system including the desktop and mobile version used by students.
 - Editing and updating the information and instructions in the Online Advising and Registration (O.A.R.) tutorial in Canvas that new students are required to complete before enrolling in classes.
- This month two new staff members were welcomed to the team. Enedelia Nicholson began as the College Navigator on Feb 1 and Karina Mendoza-Flores began as the Program Assistant on Feb 16.
- Phone and email traffic really picked up throughout the month with the launch of ctcLink and the upcoming spring registration.
- Feb 5 Enedelia attended the 3rd Annual Transfer Symposium hosted by CWU via Zoom. She attended several workshops including Guided Pathways, Equity and Access for Marginalized and Minoritized Transfer Students, and Pre-Advising Advisors.
- Feb 11 was Advising Day. Noah participated in two Allied Health advising sessions, one for Omak and one for Wenatchee.

FINANCIAL AID/VETERAN SERVICES

- The week of Feb 8 the college went live in CTCLink. Financial aid will be working in both CTCLink and the old Financial Aid Management (FAM) system.
- The processes have gone relatively smooth. Daily finding that staff need certain access and the help desk has been very responsive. SBCTC has been having daily webX to assist with job scheduling.
- IPEDS for financial aid was completed.
- VA audit is ongoing. All requested documents and information have been provided to the state auditors.
- Financial aid is getting geared up to award CARES Act/HEERF monies sometime after mid-March. Expecting to start importing 2021-2022 FAFSA information into CTCLink around mid-March

TRIO/SSS

- Currently the cohort is at 56% (79/140 participants)
- Outreach is a priority this quarter to fill the rest of the cohort
- TRIO SSS hosted a workshop, "Where do I start? Career Planning" in February for students
- Next workshop in March will be "Planning for Success" discussing time management, study skills and goal setting
- TRIO Team is creating an advising plan for upcoming academic year outlining academic discussions and advising points for each contact
- Drop in Zoom hours on Wednesdays from 10-12 have been successful, serving more students every week
- TRIO Team assisted students with ctcLink activation and registration process

- WVC's Incident Command team continues to meet about issues surrounding COVID and the governor's higher education reopening plan as it continues to change. We are working with faculty and staff on returning to campus safely, and deciding on flexible summer and fall schedules.
- The Wells Replacement project continues and good progress is being made. They are hanging dry wall and have the floors in the common spaces mostly finished. The project remains on budget and close to the timeline to open late summer/early fall.
- I continue to attend the SBCTC's weekly presidents' updates on COVID, budgets, enrollment and state and national directives that we have held since the beginning of March, 2020. It has amazingly been a year since WVC and colleges across the country pivoted to provide higher education to students mostly remotely and safely. We have now committed much of our time to the budget issues colleges are facing that the legislature. The state revenue forecast for the next biennium will be up about 9%, so that is good news. Senate and House budgets will be released in later March - a few days after the Trustee meeting.
- Community colleges fared well in the December/January COVID relief package from the federal government and seem to be doing well in the package that recently passed congress. There is also a package for state governments which should help alleviate pressures on the legislature to use more state funds for COVID relief.
- The Foundation executive committee and full board have continued meeting through Zoom and I have attended and updated them on the situation at the college.
- Have attended Omak foundation board meetings by Zoom. The Omak Foundation decided to fund internet connections for students in the Nespelem High School 21+ classes.
- WVC is live with CTCLink. We have had mostly minor issues and most of the management software is working well so far. PeopleSoft is the backbone for everything from HR and payroll to financials, students financial aid, registration, advising, and cashiering. The students were introduced to the new system and began registering for spring classes using it on Monday, March 1. We have had many employees working with students in chat boxes, webinars, on Zoom and through texts and emails to be sure their experience is the best it can be.
- The PACE task force continues meeting to map out the way to discuss the faculty and staff climate survey, and map our way forward. They will be making recommendations in early March and we will continue to plan next steps with the team once the final report is released.

- I attended the WACTC and ACT meetings in February by Zoom. I continue as a member of the Capital Budget Committee. Overall, the upcoming legislative session is the focus of our meetings. We are also continuing our overarching focus on equity and inclusion systemwide.

- Discussed college athletics and returning to play with presidents and our local athletic director. We discussed possible requirements for testing to return to play. We will continue to discuss as spring deadlines loom. It looks like we will have regional play only, with testing, beginning in April.
- Met with the Administrative Council of the Wenatchee Skills Center. We have set up a meeting to discuss creative ways to set up more partnership opportunities for our students.
